We, as a school, are able to determine how best to use the Pupil Premium grant to support pupils and raise education attainment; we create an overall package of support aimed to tackle a range of barriers as specified below.

3	Oral communication - ability to communicate effectively and at an age-commensurate level.
4	Building resilience and developing as independent learners.
5	Low aspirations and/or limited experiences. Raising aspirations and offering further enrichment experiences.

Our provision had to adapt during lockdown when hubs were opened but all vulnerable pupils had access to healthy foods and drinks. Staff worked to ensure all families were aware of and accessed their entitlement to vouchers, food banks and charity provisions throughout the pandemic in the academic year and across the summer.

Staff and resources were implemented to give additional support during mock exams, intervention and home learning Whilst pupils were not required to sit SATS, they still gained the necessary knowledge and experience to achieve outcomes that maintain standards that have placed us in the top 3% of progress nationally.
